

# History of the QEII

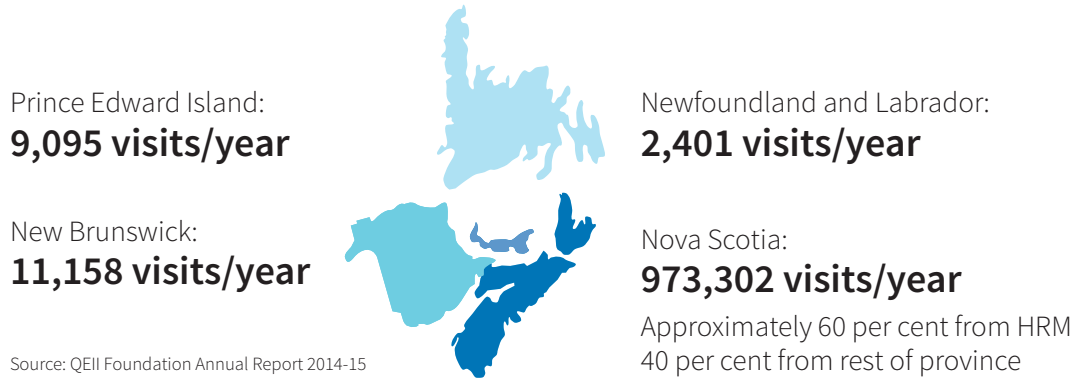
- 1859 ● Halifax City Hospital is established in the location of the current VG site – operation of the hospital suspended when the city unable to maintain it financially
- 1867 ● Former Halifax City Hospital re-opens under the name City and Provincial Hospital
- 1886 ● Sisters of Charity opens the Halifax Infirmary on the corners of Barrington and Blowers Streets in Halifax
- 1887 ● City and Provincial Hospital is renamed Victoria General in honour of the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria
- 1903 ● A new Halifax Infirmary is built on Barrington St.
- 1917 ● Camp Hill Hospital built on corner of Robie and Jubilee Streets to serve veterans
- 1933 ● A new Halifax Infirmary is built on Queen St.
- 1948 ● Victoria Building opens
- 1967 ● Centennial Wing of Victoria General Hospital opens (100 years to the day that the first patient was admitted to the City and Provincial Hospital)
- 1969 ● Pathology Institute Opens on University Avenue
- 1971 ● Abbie J. Lane Hospital built
- 1977 ● Pathology Institute renamed Dr. DJ Mackenzie Laboratories and Diagnostic Centre (now known as the Mackenzie Building)
- 1977 ● Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre built
- 1995-96 ● Provincial legislation formalizes the amalgamation of the Victoria General Hospital, Camp Hill Medical Centre, Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre and the Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation of Nova Scotia as the QEII Health Sciences Centre
- 1998 ● New Halifax Infirmary on Summer St. opens
